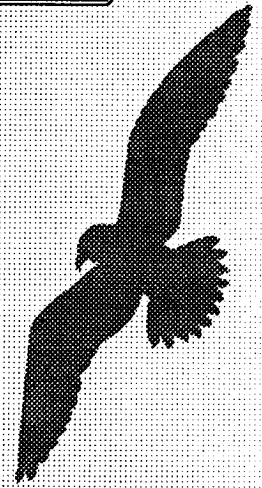

And He will talk with me.

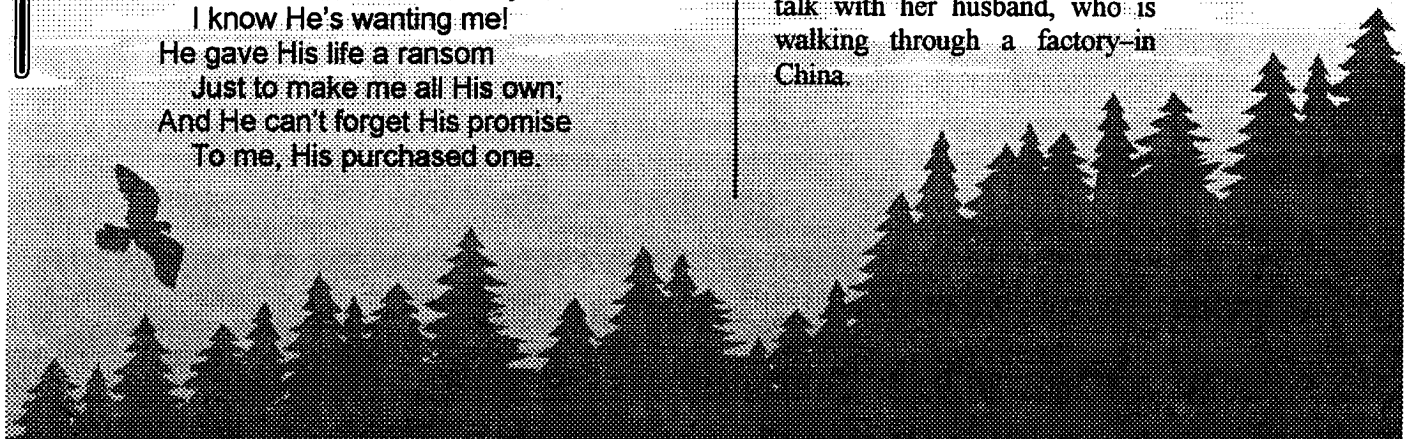

Dear Communicator,

How important is the possibility of undelayed intercommunication with other people to you? Say with family members, friends, work, business prospects, to gain information or help? Viewing people in public places, such as on sidewalks, parking lots, in stores, or driving by, either equipped with cellular phones on their belts, or busy talking on them, it would seem that many people count it very needful to be prepared for instant communication.

Doesn't it challenge your imagination to think that a farm housewife in Midwestern U.S.A. can pick up her cell phone, press a few buttons and talk with her husband, who is walking through a factory—in China.



Even more awesome is intercommunication between earth and the moon, as took place some years back.

Guglielmo Marconi and Alexander Graham Bell could hardly have visualized what effects the combination of their discoveries would have on their posterity.

Wonderful as these inventions are and as useful as they can be, even in serving God, yet He has provided His own with an intercommunication capability with Himself far exceeding the cellular phone — with no monthly or roaming charges, or need to be near a Microwave tower or having the battery charged — *PRAYER*.

The Psalmist David began one of his calls with the words, "O thou that hearest prayer, unto thee shall all flesh come" (Ps 65:2). Another user of this service, Isaiah, bore witness to the workableness of it with the words, "The Lord's hand is not shortened, that it cannot save: neither his ear heavy, that it cannot *hear*" (Isaiah.59: 1).

Unlike the old time party line when consideration needed to be shown to other users by short calls, we are exhorted to, "Pray without ceasing" (1 Thes. 5:17). Due to God's omnipotence, all calls can be received without the use of "call waiting" or pressing the hold button.

We enjoy hearing the voice of a dear friend from a great distance as Solomon intimates with the simile, "As cold waters to a thirsty soul, so is good news from a far country" (Prov. 25:25). How many times we read of the Old Testament saints being *talked to* by God. "The Lord talked with you face to face in the mount out of the midst of the fire" (Deut. 5:4).

Think of the longing expressed by the Lord in the words, "Behold I stand at the door and knock: if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and sup with him, and he with me" (Rev. 3:20). What communion the word "sup" pictures for us. Imagine what it would be like to sit across the table from the Lord.

Asking for things comes easy for us, doesn't it, and scripture gives us this liberty. "And all things, whatsoever ye shall ask in prayer, believing, ye shall receive" (Matt.21:22). On the other hand there is a qualification to this, for we also read, "Ye ask, and receive not, because ye ask amiss, that ye may consume it upon your lusts" (James 4:3). God sees the motive behind our requests and only dispenses what will be for our real benefit, and His glory.

In closing may I remind each one of us to follow up heavenward 911 calls with thanksgiving, both in view of the coming answer, and when it comes. "With thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God" (Phil. 4:6).
