


During this powerless time, my thoughts turned to how dependent we are on a power source outside of ourselves. of a thought..."God said...and it was so" (Gen. 1:11). Creation is a great marvel to man, and who can duplicate such an act of power. Day by day, "The heavens declare the glory of God; and the fir-



mament showeth his handiwork." (Ps.19:1,2). At ground level we are often privileged to witness displays of His power when:

"The voice of the Lord divideth flames of fire" [forked lightening] Ps.29:7

"The voice of the Lord shaketh the wilderness" [roar of thunder] Ps.29:8

In the case of the fleeing Prophet Jonah, his course was arrested when, "The Lord sent out a great wind into the sea" (Jonah 1:4).

Two thousand years ago, with the wind howling and the waves filling the disciples ship, in response to their plea for help, Jesus, "Arose, and rebuked the wind, and said unto the sea, Peace be still. And the wind ceased, and there was a great calm" (Mark 4:48). In the observers' eyes, what authority!

Several years ago, on a Lord's Day Morning, with most everyone assembled for Sunday School, a large spreading tree in the yard in front of the building, with little provocation to cause it, fell with such precision so as to miss the power line entering the building and to have only a branch or two brush one of the cars with minimal damage. Truly, as used to be proclaimed, "An act of God".

While we have been enumerating some of the displays of God's power, which are all too often characterized as natural occurances, a couplet has been running through my mind

"T'was great to speak the world from naught; T'was greater to redeem!"

That we all need to be redeemed from our sinful nature and its deeds is established by the proclamation, "All have sinned, and come short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:23). But how? for the puzzling question, "What shall a man give in exchange for his soul" (Matt. 16:22) intimates that we have no medium of exchange to alter our situation; in fact our natural condition is, "Without hope, and without God in the world." (Eph. 2:12).

Hopeless? Yes, in ourselves, "But God, who is rich in mercy, for his great love wherewith he loved us" (Eph. 2:4) made a way, and that way was in and through the One Who could say, "I am the way" (John 14:5)...Jesus. "For God sent his not son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved." (John 3:17).

While we might not connect a display of power with our salvation, not only was God having to contend with the power of Satan, but also our willful and sinful nature in bringing us to Himself willingly. The Lord was not selective in whom He chose to redeem, "But as many as received him, to them gave he power to become the sons of God,, even to them that believe on his name" (John

1:12). To scoffers viewing God's Son on the cross, it is the epitome of failure and weakness, thus, "The preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness; but unto us which are saved, it is the power of God" (1Cor. 1:18).

Jesus...to suffer this ignominious death, "Was delivered for our offenses, and was raised again for our justification" (Rom. 4:25). So we have our responsibility through our offenses in making it necessary for Him to die, that we might be redeemed. How wonderful if you have, through the power or the word of the cross, believed on the wonderful Saviour; but that is not the end of God displaying His power. For we are those "Who are kept [guarded] by the power of God through faith unto salvation ready to be revealed in the last time" (1Peter 1:5).

One final majestic act of power to complete our redemption will take place when, "God hath both raised up the Lord, and will also raise up us by his own power" (1Cor. 6:14). Each day we can say, "Now is our salvation nearer than when we believed" (Rom. 13:11).
