Have you ever been disappointed? I am sure that every one of us has been disappointed at different times in our lives. The things that we had hoped for or counted upon just did not turn out the way we wanted them too. It may have been the loss of a job or worse yet, the loss of a dear friend or a member of our family, a wife or a husband.

I remember one time when I was disappointed someone called my attention to the fact that I needed to change the first letter in the word "disappointment" from a "d" to a capital "H." If we read it with a capital "H" it spells out two words "His appointment."

As we take our disappointments and those burdens that weigh us down to the Lord and leave them there, we will be drawn closer to the Lord and the



result will be peace in our hearts and lives. The apostle Paul brought his disappointment to the Lord three times and then found that it was His appointment. The Lord did not take away Paul's thorn in the flesh but instead gave Paul to experience His wonderful grace. God told him, "My grace is sufficient for thee: for My strength is made perfect in weakness." 2 Corinthians 12: 7-11.

As a result Paul learned to boast in his trials and to take pleasure in his weaknesses and persecutions because when he was consciously weak he then could realize God's strength. As he was inspired to write, "When I am weak, then am I strong."

One has said and I quote: "Conscious weakness causes a saint not to dare to move without God." And again "The place of strength is always that of being forced to lean on God." "The eternal God is thy Refuge and underneath are the everlasting arms." Deuteronomy 33:27. Disappointments are easily turned to His appointments when we are made to lean on those everlasting arms of God's love and strength.

We are reminded that we are not to despise or take lightly the chastening or discipline of the Lord. Why not? "For whom the Lord loveth He chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom He receiveth."
