Dear Friends.

As we begin a new year I would like to call your attention to two kinds of rest that the Lord Jesus has promised to us. There is a rest that He gives and a rest that we can find. The first one has to with our salvation and the second one with our daily walk through this world.

Let's notice the first one. It is an invitation by the Lord Jesus: "Come unto Me." I am sure that everyone of us who have accepted the Lord Jesus as our personal Savior can remember that first time when we came to the Lord Jesus

"heavy laden" or burdened with our sins. We came to Jesus as we were "without one plea." We confessed our sins to Him, our heavy load of sins were gone and we had peace with God. We



believed that Christ died for our sins, that He took our place on the cross and bore our sins in His own body on the cross. See 1 Peter 2:24; 1 John 1:9. As a result we were no longer seeking to earn our salvation by good works: the heavy load of our sins was gone. We were no longer "heavy laden." Being "justified by faith" we found peace "with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." Romans 5:1. We then experienced the wonderful rest of conscience that the Lord gives to them who have accepted Him as Lord and Savior. "As far as the east is from the west, so far hath He removed our transgressions from us." Psalm 103:12. We were saved from the penalty of our sins.

How do we find or experience that second rest? We have to take His yoke upon us and learn of Him. First of all: What is a yoke? When we think of a yoke we usually think of two animals joined together by a wooden bar around their necks. In this way they are forced to work together when pulling heavy loads or in plowing fields. As one has described it so well "a yoke is designed to curb the will and bring one under control."

Those who would seek to keep the law for salvation put themselves under a yoke of bondage. See Acts 15:10; Galatians 5:1. But if we take Christ's yoke upon us then we share it with One who is far stronger and far greater than we. That makes His yoke easy to bear and His burden is light.

A servant of Christ was once asked the question: "Do you know why His yoke is light? The answer was "Well, because the Lord helps us to carry it I suppose." No, the questioner said and then replied: "When I was a boy at home, I used to drive the oxen, and the yoke was never made to balance the load. Father's yokes were always made heavier on one side than the other. Then, you see, we would put a weak bullock in alongside a strong bullock; the light end would come on the weak ox, the heavier end on the stronger one. That's why the yoke is easy and the burden is light, because the Lord's yoke is made after the same pattern, and the heavy end is upon His shoulder."

The Lord invites us to take His yoke upon us. The decision to take Christ's yoke is up to us. If we refuse to take His yoke and go our own way then we will miss the rest that He has promised. If we take Christ's yoke upon us then we must go where He wants us to go and do what He wants us to do. After the apostle Paul was converted his first words were: "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" Acts 9:1-6. This should be the question that every believer should ask of the Lord after he or she is saved.

His yoke is easy and his burden is light because His love for us has filled our hearts. This verse of a hymn expresses it so beautifully "The slave of sin and fear,
Thy truth my bondage broke;
My willing spirit loves to bear
Thy light and easy yoke;
The love that fills my grateful breast
Makes duty joy, and labor rest."
