
Mi Amigos,

love to the Corinthians, in spite of the reservations he may have had of the results, "And I will very gladly spend and be spent for you; though the more abundantly I love you, the less I be loved" (2Cor. 13:15). This servant of the Lord was no fair weather friend, but carried out the description found in Prov. 17:17, that, "A friend loveth at all times." Now, if this friend had a genetic relation, so much the better for, "A brother is born for adversity." I don't mean a sparing partner, as a man I worked with considered his brother when they were growing up.

Most people like to have friends and, "A man that hath friends must show himself friendly" (Prov. 18:24), but in making close friends we need to consider the effect they might have on our lives. No doubt you have heard the couplet: Birds of a feather__Flock together, but sometimes we might get into the wrong crowd and have to suffer for it. "He that walketh with wise men shall be wise: but a companion of fools shall be destroyed" (Prov. 13:20). May we each who are believers be able to say with the Psalmist, "I am a companion of all them that fear thee, and of them that keep thy precepts" (Ps. 119:63).

Not only may our friends have an effect upon our lives and how we might think, but also our relationship with God. The question is asked, "Know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity with God" (James 4:4)?

Think or our early parents, how God would come to the Garden and walk with them until they started to hob-nob with Satan, and, as a result sin entered into the world; the intimate relationship was ended. "Therefore the Lord God sent him forth from the garden of Eden" (Gen. 3:23).

On the other hand, we find in the prayer of Jehoshaphat these words, "Art not thou our God, who didst drive out the inhabitants of this land before thy people Israel, and gavest it to the seed of Abraham thy friend for ever" (2 Chron. 20:7)? This closeness is further revealed by these words, "And the Lord said, Shall I hide from Abraham that thing which I do...For I know him" (Gen. 18:17 & 19a)? Think or the honor shown to sinful man, to be cherished as a friend of God.

In spite of the intimate relationship being broken by sin entering into the world, God wanted to reestablish this relationship, thus we read in His word, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). "So" is such a little word that it is hard to comprehend the depth of love it expresses, until we come to the greatest gift that could be given.

While instructing His disciples, Jesus spoke these words, "This is my commandment, That ye love one another, as I have loved you. Greater love hath no

man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. Ye are my friends, if ye do whatsoever I command you" (John 15:12-14). How little at the time the twelve entered into the words, "As I have loved you," but in a short time they saw by example the depth of His love manifested by the cross.

May we each one have the desire to be known as a friend of God.
